Course Contents:		The main objective of this course is to provide freshmen students with the ability of thinking as a “lawyer.” That is to say, to introduce students essentially to the instruments that would help them in determining whether an issue is legal or not, in bringing solutions to legal issues by the application of legal methodology. In this regard, primarily “the notion of law” will be mentioned within the scope of the course. And the notion’s relation with the society, order, legitimacy, norm, and enforcement will be addressed. After that, the distinction of legal norms from other codes of conduct and the relation between them will be discussed. Following this introduction, we will refer to the matter of the application of positive norms as a broader topic. In this regard, in turn, we will discuss the subjects of the sources of law, the hierarchy of norms, basic terms of law, the distinction between public law and private law, and the branches of law. Ultimately, we will insist on the application of positive law in the narrowest sense, that is to say, solving legal disputes by applying the abstract norm related. Within this framework, we will primarily study on the laws of logic, and then focus on the issue that how rules of logic function in the application of law. The differences within the scope of public law and private law, the analysis of the legal norm, methods of judicial interpretation, analogy, argumentum a contrario, argumentum a fortiori, the judiciary role of filling in gaps left by legal rules, discretion of judge will be dealt with the examples from practice.

Different answers to these questions set ground for the main distinction in the history of philosophy of law as well: Natural law theory and legal positivism. Within the scope of this course, starting from Ancient Greek and Rome, we will primarily focus on traditional natural law theory, and then study the effects of monotheistic religions, especially of Christianity, on this tradition. We will mention how the modern state, which is starting to take its form in theory and in practice within the 16th and 17th century, in Western Europe radically change the way of thinking on law, and in this context, we will deal with the social contract theory and sovereignty. After that, following these developments we will address the effects of positivism on legal theory; particularly, we will examine the relationship between legal positivism and modern natural law theory through the critical debates after World War II. And finally, by referring to significant examples (Marxist legal theory, feminist legal theory etc.) we will discuss critical legal studies that approach liberal rights theory and modern democracy critically.

Course Contents:	The aim of this course is to approach to law the subject matter of sociology of law, namely as a social institution, within its relations with other social institutions. In other words, the objective of this course is to analyze law's empirical existence or its social reality with a point of view provided by the method of social sciences. In order to ground such an analysis, in this course we will examine historical perspectives within the context of their approaches on the origin of law and the relation between law and society, by referring to the work of the pioneers of social theory. Then, we will emphasize on the social processes where law appears both as a result and a factor. In this regard, our concern is to examine the effects of legal norms on social institutions and society as a whole, along with the effects of social relations and actual conditions on bringing into being, upholding, changing or removing of legal norms. And within this framework, we will analyze the connection of law with the basic subject matters of sociology like social stratification, social control, social conflict, social order, and social identities. At the					



	same time, we will examine the role of law both in the reproduction of social inequalities and in the elimination of these inequalities by social change.
